This verse is so good and so short and it's so powerful. It really shows us how God's economy works. It's not about supply and demand. It's actually about when we give, when we're generous, will prosper. That word prosper here means like get fat. Okay. It doesn't mean just like you'll have enough, but more than enough. And what's really interesting. I want you to look at this refreshed here, this, this word, refresh, it occurs twice, right? In that second line. Do you see that? And that is, let me make sure I pronounce this right.

I know I studied Hebrew, but it's been a little while. Okay. So it's the Hebrew word. Riva.

Can you guys say Riva Riva

It's a term that when there's a huge outpouring of rain and the ground, he's drenched, it's Rivas, it's, you've eaten so much that you're completely full and satisfied. It's a word that means all sorts of things I got. So, so satisfied or filled up would be I think, a pretty good translation of this verse. So when we're talking about how we want to be refreshed, we want to be rejuvenated. We want to be filled up ourselves. I think this verse kind of shows us how to do it. And, and what does it tell us to do

Refresh others? Interesting. Right?

Those of us were like, when am I going to get rejuvenated? I need to go on a vacation. And then you go on vacation. You get home and you need a vacation from the vacation, right? Yeah. Because you're exhausted. You've been, oh my gosh, it's crazy. And then you try to get back into the swing of things. And you're like, oh my gosh, this is worse than before I left left. I'm exhausted. You're like, okay, now I'm going to, I'm just going to go treat myself. And then you feel worse afterwards. Right. Spent too much money. I ate too much food. Right? Don't we do this when we're just looking after ourselves. It's not very refreshing. In fact, however, when we start to look, how can I refresh others? It in turns, refreshes us. That's what the scripture is telling

Us. And

The generosity here I believe is about everything in our life. In fact, we have a core value here at our church called generous living. Okay, generous living. We don't just mean with your money, but with everything you are, are you generous and the way you live with your time, your talents and your treasures. So we say here that we gladly give our time talents and treasures to serve God and one another. And when we do that, what we're seeing here is that we're actually refreshing ourselves. We're actually refreshing ourselves, that we get so much more in return than what we give. And that's why we need to learn how to revolve others, right? So that we could be revoked. That's not proper Hebrew grammar, but you guys get it right.

So I read a book earlier this year called the giver and the gift and just started reading it. It was about generosity. And it was co-written by, by one guy who was, I mean, one guy who ran a nonprofit. And it was also by written by a philanthropist. So they're saying how they work together, you know, the giver and the gift and this philanthropist. I didn't even realize it until I started reading. It was a guy by the name of David Weekley. You ever heard of him? Who in here lives in a David Weekley home, anybody we got, we got one over here. You had David weekly. If you go around some of the homes in central park or out in green valley, ranch are David Weekley homes. And I nothing about the dude, right? Some guy in Texas turns out, but as I read it, he started sharing his story because David weekly is a follower of Jesus.

And he has built the, the largest private home building company in the entire country. It's like, oh, that's pretty impressive. But then he taught, what about some of his stories? So David Weekley started his company when he's 23 years old and it boomed boomed in the late seventies, early eighties, he was going great. He was at one point building 300 homes a year with a small company, making millions of dollars. He bought his BMW. He had broken ground to start building he and his wife's dream home. That was 10,000 square feet. And one of the best neighborhoods in Houston going great. But then in the mid eighties,

The housing market crashed it tanked. He lost almost everything. He had to sell his BMW. He

0 (10m 19s):

Had to sell his home. He lost everything in barely was scraping by every year just to survive and make his company make it through there. He said that he was driving one day and he saw that there was a car in front of him. And on the bumper sticker, it said, Lord, if you give me another boom, I promise I'll do it right next time. And he saw that and he's like, that's going to be my prayer. He said, God gave me another boom and I'm going to do it right next time. And he started praying that I'll do it. Right. And then he made a commitment. He made it commitment, not just to be because he had been a Christian before. And he said, you know, I thought I earned my success by my hard work in there on my smarts. He's like, but, but I realized I had lost everything by my smarts.

So he said this, his commitment was to give away 50% of his

1 (11m 4s):

From then on and 50% of his time. That's

0 (11m 11s):

50% of the time. He said, I'm going to give away 50% of my income and 50% of my time, as long as I can. And he started doing it. And of course, a business that as the housing market started to grow again in the nineties, he and his business grew, he had to hire a COO who eventually became the CEO so that he could give 50% of his time. So what he started doing was giving away money, a lot of money, 50% of his income. And then he would work with those organizations and coach them as a CEO, knowing how to build companies. So we would take little non-profits and teach them how to grow and expand and reach people all over the world through micro loans and through helping people with water and food all over the world and working with ministries.

And he realized that he could do it. And this is one of the coolest things he said here at the end of the book, he said this, when I give freely of my time, talent and resources, I feel and awesome. Joy not only did is his company right now, the biggest private home builder in the entire country, that he has made a lot more money since then. And his company is rated one of the best places to work in, in the state of Texas. On top of that, he feels an awesome joy as he does.

That's pretty cool. Right?

I think that shows how this works. See a lot of us think that when we, you see someone like David weekly, when we see generous people and we're like, wow, they're giving so much money. They're giving a million dollars over here. Wow. That's so amazing. Got a wing named after him over here. It's because they're rich that they can do that. But perhaps we're thinking about this backwards, perhaps the reason why they are rich and can give more is because they chose to, if not always, but I think in God's economy, he's waiting for us to give, some of us are like, once I make a certain amount of money, then I'll start giving. Once I reach a certain level, then I'll start typing. Once the kids are out of the home, you know, we have these things after this time, then I'll be generous, but maybe we need to reverse it and say, maybe I should be generous

Watch to see will God bless me and prosper me in these things. Now some of you are like, Hmm, man, I don't know. You're kind of getting a little bit out there, but let me just look at some of these statistics, because he talks about the awesome joy of giving. And there's been a lot of studies on giving and generosity. There was one out of Harvard in 2008, and this study tracked people and looked at how much they gave and where they gave and what they found. And this is the cool thing in the study that people who give away money, who are generous with their time, talents and treasures, not, not just money, but their time as well. When they volunteer that they have lower cortisol.

You know what cortisol is, causes stress and anxiety.

0 (13m 48s):

You're like, oh my gosh, I'm so stressed. Maybe you should try giving. Okay. Studies have found that people who give more have lower levels of cortisol. There's another study out of the university of Buffalo that found that people who give generously live longer, Christian Smith and Hillary Davidson, two professors out of Notre Dame wrote a book called the paradox of generosity. And they studied all of these things as sociologists. And what they found was that those who give are much more likely to have excellent health to report being very happy. They have less depression and less instances of mental.

Okay? These studies aren't even looking at the Bible. Okay? Scripture says, if you refresh others, you'll be refreshed. But this is telling us that something happens in our lives when we're willing to give study after study. And yet what they have found is that 85% of people in our nation give less than 2% of their income away. 85% give less than 2%. And half of those people give nothing

Away. No wonder

0 (14m 55s):

Why we're so angry and upset and unhappy and dine early, right? Because this one thing that's now psychologically proven to refresh you and make your life better. People are choosing not to do it. They're holding on too tightly close fisted, right. With the things they have. And that's why I'm saying from the scripture. And we're going to look at all a bunch of scriptures here in just a second from the scripture we learned that God feels open hands, not close hand. If you have a close hand and you're holding on tightly to things, unwilling, to let things go, and you say, I got to hold onto this. I don't have enough. I don't know if I'll have enough. What, what in case, what if something happens? I just need to keep this in case when we do that, God might not fill our hands.

See God feels open hand. So we've got to learn to let go of that alert to let go. Andrew Carnegie of course was one of like the first like super wealthy people

In our nation. Right? He was just a businessman, made a ton of money and he became a philanthropist and started giving him his way as money. And he gave a lot of money every year to the New York Philharmonic. And they came to him one year and they said, would you please write us a check for \$60,000? We need a grant. And at the time that that's a lot of money. Okay. Just in case you guys didn't know that,

Okay. It was a lot of money back in

0 (16m 10s):

60,000. It's a lot of money today, right? \$60,000 me. And he's like, ah, just getting a little annoyed about this. Okay. Every year he's got a fun, this Phil harmonic, right? Everybody else gets to benefit. And he said, why don't you go find some other people, other people that want to give, right? So if you go find somebody or a group of people that can give \$30,000, I will give the second 30,000. You come back to me. So this fundraiser for the New York Philharmonic leaves and the next day he comes back in and he says, I got the \$30,000 right here. So will you write that check? And your Carnegie's like, well, that was, that was quick, but okay. I'll write the check. And he said, you know, I'm just curious, who wrote the check for the other half of the money? And the man replied.

It was Mrs. Carnegie. <inaudible> You know, if we have to learn to not have close hands, right? We've gotta have the open hands. God has given us so much. How can we hold onto it as if it was ours to begin with, as if we brought it all up on ourself, our success, our earning, our money, our, our savings account, all of it. We've got to hold onto it. God is saying

Open your hands, open your hands. Cause God feels open hands.

Now I know that some of you are already struggling with this. You're like, I don't know, he's this, this right. Theologically. Like, where are our, where is it? If you've ever heard of prosperity, theology of prosperity preachers, it is an error. It's not taught in the Bible. These are the people who will preach that. If you give your money to me, they'll say that, right. God will bless you. If you give me a hundred dollars, God will give you 200. And if you, you know, fund my private, it's my second

private jet. It's only \$80 million. If you fund that, bless you. I wish I were making up that story. Okay.

Was reading the news. That's prosperity, theology. It is running rampant around the globe. As people take advantage of people in poverty gate, it is a lie. It's not true. God does not promise us like an equal amount of riches. If we give away money, okay, that's prosperity theology. It's an error on this side, but there's also a second error. And it, I would call it poverty, theology and poverty theology is that Jesus was homeless. You should be homeless too. And they make you feel guilty for having anything. And, and there's nothing good that God promises you in this life. It's only after you die. Maybe things will get better. Then that's poverty theology. And it's just as wrong because in the scriptures, there are promise after promise after promise after promise related to our generosity.

It's generosity, generosity, and it's promises and promises of reward. So I want to show you eight things from the scriptures you get. When you give we're just going to look at the scripture, okay? We're going to see what the Bible actually says. Eight things you get when you give. So what are the eight things that the Bible talks about? And I looked at tons of scripture this week and I boiled it down to these eight for you guys. You can take me later. Okay? So eight things you get when you give one abundant provision, abundant provision, sinker Corinthians nine, seven, and eight says, each of you should give, and God was able to bless you abundantly. So that in all things at all times, having all that you need, God has provisioned for you.

The food and clothing and nothing else, but he can provide and abundantly. It says, okay, so this is more than you need. This is you're gonna have, I have what you need. Plus this is a promise from God that we can claim in every moment of my life until I die until the Lord takes me, I will what

This was Malakai. God says return to me. Then I will return to you. It says the Lord, but you ask, how can we return? And God responds. You steal from me when you do not bring me a tent,

When you give, seeing someone smile, when you, I give you a hug, you know, it fills you so much more. This week. I was discipling him, helping him follow Jesus. And one day he said, Matt, what about tithing? I can teach you about it, but okay. That point I gave nothing. I was like, I'm a college student. I'm broke all the time on eating like tortillas with hotdogs, cheese, you guys eating those.

That was like every day for me. Right? A little American cheese and a hot dog and a tortilla. Right? The color Camille. Okay. That's what I ate.
