0 (0s):

The beverage in-person and online in a rise church.

1 (10s):

All right, welcome everyone. I am so glad that you guys are here. My name is Matt Wolf. If I haven't met you, I'm the lead pastor here. And I want to get to know you. And I said, yes, he is interested. I don't care if you're not a church goer, you're going to want to be here for this. It's not a church service. We are going to be packing meals. It's gonna be exciting. So make sure you guys are coming to that, inviting people to it. It's going to be awesome.

1 (51s):

I want to do, before we jump into our series, our, our, our new series and our message on miracles. I wanted to just say, do a special prayer. We have so many people in our church that are in the medical field, and it's a pretty hard season right now. So if you're here and you're in the medical field in any way, doctor, the technician, nurse administrator, could you please stand right now? Would you, would you please stand right now? I know. And we have some please stand Rachel. Okay. I see you. Okay. Let's just give them a hand. All those people in the medical field. We appreciate you guys. And I just want to pray for them because I know this has been a, been a challenging season. Would you all pray with me, Lord God, we do lift up those who are working in, in a very challenging time. And it's been tough for two years, but with the numbers peaking in Colorado with so many issues in hospitals being overflowed with, with COVID patients and others, Lord God, we just pray for your grace and your mercy to bound to our medical doctors, nurses, technicians, custodians, administrators, people that work in hospitals.

1 (1m 50s):

Lord God, we just pray that you'd give them strength right now in the season endurance. And we pray for courage that they would continue to push ahead. Even when things are challenging, I pray for a fresh burst of that strength today. And Lord God that you would just be with them because you, God are the great healer and your son is the great physician. So we just pray this blessing on them in this season, in the, especially those who have to be working this morning, because they are at hospital or wherever it is, Lord God that you would bless them, especially. And I pray this in Jesus name. Amen. All right, well who's ready for miracles. Yeah, Jen is ready. Okay, good. I think it's going to be a fun season series.

1 (2m 31s):

It was a great first service as well. So miracles, can we, can we still believe in miracles today? Okay. Some people are saying yes. Other people are like, I don't think so. Okay. I don't know. It seems like in our modern,

advanced, educated, scientific age, we need to leave miracles behind, right? That just the idea of believing any supernatural things. Can we even do it anymore? I have a few quotes from some philosophers and scientists that show what a lot of people feel about miracles today. And this first one is from Robert Green Ingersoll, if philosopher, and he said, ignorance is the soil in which belief in miracles gross. You believe in miracles. You guys are ignorant.

1 (3m 11s):

Okay. Shouldn't you know, better by now. Miracles don't happen. They don't really exist anymore. It's ignorance. If you believe in them at all, or how about Ethan Allen? Not the furniture maker. Okay. This is a philosopher as well. Over a hundred years ago, said in those parts of the world where learning and science has prevailed, miracles have ceased. But in those parts of it, as our barbarous and ignorant miracles are still in Vogue over a hundred years ago said, Hey, we don't experience miracles here in the west world. We're smarter educated, scientific, or max plunk. The German physicist who in the 1930s said faith in miracles must yield ground step-by-step before the steady and from advance of the forces of science and its total defeat is in debatably.

1 (4m 4s):

A mere matter of time in Dubai audibly, we scientists have figured this out. We don't believe in the miraculous anymore. It's time to put those childish ignorant, foolish, unscientific beliefs behind. Some of you have heard people say this stuff, you've read these scientists. You've heard them. There've been your teachers, your professors, perhaps. You're one of them here today. You know, it's amazing that not only are there, we have a lot of people that just don't believe in the supernatural, but there's even as we're going to talk about today, a lot of us who are Christians going to church, do we really believe in miracles? See, I think a lot of people go about their entire life as if miracles don't and can't happen.

1 (4m 50s):

They're for all intents and purposes, practical atheists in unbelieving believer. And that's the title I messaged today. The unbelieving believer, because we're actually going to look at someone from the Bible who I think could fit that very well. And unbelieving believer because a lot of us, whether we're believers or not would say miracles, I don't know. I've never experienced. I've never seen it, but that that's, maybe other people are way back in time. They believed in that stuff. But not us. I don't think so anymore, but I'm going to challenge you today. Don't be an unbelieving believer. Don't be an unbelieving believer. It's time to reassess everything to have an open mind. Some of you are like, I don't think, I believe you're, you're listening to my voice right now because somebody shared this with you because they know you're an atheist or agnostic.

1 (5m 32s):

Like you keep an open mind. Cause that's what we're supposed to do in our modern scientific area. Right? We're supposed to have an open mind, open to evidence. And that's what we're going to talk about today. As we open up this series on miracles today. So this series is around the miracles of Christmas because yes,

Christmas is all about miracles. And I'm not just talking about that fat man getting down your chimney, okay. Or whatever happened on 34th, I am talking about the miracles that are quintessential to the Christmas story, miracles like, you know, a young woman getting pregnant without sexual intercourse, miracle or all these dozens of prophecies, coinciding and happening.

1 (6m 14s):

Exactly. It was prophesied hundreds and thousands of years in the birth of Jesus or about the miracles of God himself coming down as a homosapien with flesh and blood among us miracles. Christmas is all about miracle. So we're going to look at some of these miracles and we're going to take those. And it's actually going to give us ground to ask some deeper questions. Can we believe, you know, do miracles still happen today? Can we pray for them? What if I'm not experiencing miracle? We're going to talk about that. All in this series. And most of our messages here are expository messages. And if you don't know what that means, that's okay. We expose the Bible here. That's what my job is. Here's what the Bible says. Let me tell you about it. Okay. That's what I do. In fact, I teach preaching, expository preaching over at Denver seminary.

1 (6m 55s):

So I'm all about that. But this series is going to be a little different because we're going to use these stories of miracles in the Bible. And we're gonna use them as the starting ground to get into these questions that we all have about miracles. Okay? You guys tracking with me on this series. So what we're going to do today is look at one of the miracles that happened right before the Christmas miracles that we know about. And it's going to be in Luke chapter one, verse five. We're going to go from verses five to 25. Today. If you have a Bible, you can open up there. If you have the YouVersion Bible app on your phone, if you don't, you should get it because we have our rice church, Denver event there in the app and you can take notes, see the scriptures that we're using for today and also see some links in that app. So please do that. And we're going to start in Luke one, verse five, as we are introduced to an unbelieving believer you guys ready for this verse five, it says in the time of Herod king of Judea, there was a priest named Zika Riah.

1 (7m 49s):

He's a priest. He's a religious dude. He works for God who belonged to the priestly division of Abijah. You guys know about that. His wife Elizabeth was also a descendant of Aaron. So why does it tell us these details about who Zechariah is? Well, he's a priest. He's a religious dude and he comes from a line. There were 24 different lines houses within the priests, among the priests. And Abijah that family tracing their lineage back over a thousand years, Zechariah can trace his lineage. He's got priestly blood. Okay. And his wife is priestly blood as well. Elizabeth was a descendant of Aaron.

1 (8m 29s):

Do you know who Aaron is? The brother of Moses, the very first high priest. Okay. This is as religious of a bloodline. As you can get, this family has been religious for as long as anyone can know. And here's this priest Zachariah, a religious dude in verse six. It tells us they're not just religious blood, but they're religious

in action as well. Verse six. It says both of them were righteous in the sight of God observing all the Lord's commands and decrees. Blamelessly raise your hand. If that sentence could describe you. Okay? Yeah. None of us are going to raise our hands, right? We're not blameless. We're not righteous. And yet that's what it says about these guys. They were religious and everybody saw it. They did everything, right? They follow the Bible. They knew the Bible, they did what they were supposed to do.

1 (9m 11s):

So this is as a religious person. As you can get living as righteously as a religious person can, but they have an issue in verse seven, but they were childless because Elizabeth was not able to conceive wherever the physical or medical reason. We don't know Elizabeth couldn't get pregnant and she wanted to, and to top it all off, it says they were both very old. Now this might echo a story from some of you. If you're Bible readers or grew up in the church from Abraham and Sarah who were both very old facing the same situation, we're not told how old they were. Unlike Abraham and Sarah who were told, were guite old.

1 (9m 52s):

I did a lot of research on this, about that phrase, very old. And, and I wish it would tell us how old they were. One scholar said that this language was probably used to people over 60. We can't be sure, but we know that they were old. She was physically unable to conceive and they were way past the child-bearing years. And this wasn't an a day and age where they could just travel to the best clinic and go get some in vitro, right? It didn't exist. They could not have a child. This religious family verse eight. We continue reading. It says once when Zechariah's division was on duty and he was serving as priest before God, he was chosen by lot, according to the custom of the priesthood to go into the temple of the Lord and burn incense.

1 (10m 38s):

So there are 24 different clans among the priests. And they each served for a couple of weeks a year. So one week in the spring, maybe one week in the fall so that all the whole year could be covered. So this guy would work in the temple with the holy place where God resided in the effort, all these sacrifices. So he's there already. This is one of the most religious and important times of the year. This is his big week for me. It's like Christmas and Easter, right? As a pastor. Okay. These are big weeks. This is a big week for Zechariah. He's in there serving he's faithful. And then on top of that, he gets chosen by lot. Meaning they cast some dye to pick who among that clan would get to go into the sacred place into the center because only one person was allowed in. And that one person would be able to go light incense.

1 (11m 22s):

Now there were so many priests in those days that you would only get chosen by lot. Maybe once in your entire life, it's go in there. Like the incense. They did it in the morning. And in the evening, we don't know which one it is here, but he's chosen. He gets to do it. This is a big deal. Hey, this is not just like Easter. Cause that comes every year. Okay. This is like the pastor that gets to go preach at the white house. That's a big deal. I'm not going to be that guy. Right? Okay. Those are the big deal. Rick Warren Andy Stanley type.

Right? Okay. This is a big deal that he gets it. So this is one of the most religious people in one of the most religious times, most righteous people around and here he is on his big religious day.

1 (12m 4s):

This guy should be the best believer of them. All right. And yet that's not the case because he goes into the sacred place. Only one person was allowed in. So nobody's in there. He goes into the sacred place, goes up to the altar. He lights the incense. And while he's doing that, I just imagined him. He just kind of chilling. There's this dude in there in angel, Hey Zach, what's up? Hey, that's what's going on. Okay. And angel is there in the sacred place where nobody else could go in except this one priest. And he goes in and this angel addresses Zechariah. And he says, Zechariah, we've heard your prayer. And he's been praying. I'm sure it for a very long time for a child, your prayer will be answered.

1 (12m 46s):

Elizabeth will be pregnant a miracle. And not only that, your son will be named John. You guys might know him as John, the Baptist and this John has been prophesied about, he references a prophecy that comes from Malakai in Malakai. There were two different prophecies about this person who would come before the Messiah. And there's another one in Isaiah. There's all these prophecies. And this angel saying Zechariah, you're going to be the father of John. Who's going to prepare the way for the Messiah because I'm gonna say, I can't just come on his own. Okay. Somebody's got to prepare the way. And that is your son. He will preach and turn people in repentance back to me. It's going to be amazing. And then the Messiah will come. That's a big deal, right?

1 (13m 27s):

Angel stone, a miracle is going to happen. It's going to be exciting. This is amazing. And here's Zechariah. One of the most religious people alive in his day, righteous knows the Bible probably could quote the exact verse that this angel is referencing for Malakai. He knows it all. He sees an angel there in the holy place on this one time in his life that he actually gets to enter into this special room. And you know what happens? He doesn't believe. That's what it tells us. Look at this in verse 18, Zechariah asked the angel, how can I be sure of this? I don't know. My life's pretty old.

1 (14m 8s):

It's not going to happen. I don't believe it. I am an old man. And my wife is well along in years, he said, it's not going to happen. I don't believe he's an unbelieving believers. He, and I'm saying this because a lot of people look at miracles and they're like, oh, everybody used to believe in miracles back in the day. Right? Everybody just thought everything that happened that they didn't understand was a miracle. That's not true. It's an ignorance. And in fact, CS Lewis calls it chronological snobbery. We think because we're later in time, we're smarter than everyone who's ever come before us. But if you read the Bible almost every time, there's a miracle. There are people who don't believe. People have not believed in miracles forever.

1 (14m 49s):

Okay. And Zechariah who should believe above everyone else. And he doesn't even believe that this miracle is possible. Do you see that? He's an unbelieving believer and that's why it says in verse 19, the angel said to him, I am Gabriel. I am Gabriel. I don't know if you knew this, but there were only two angels who are named in the entire Bible. If you're doing, you know, Bible trivia, trivial pursuit, this, this holiday season. Now, you know the answer to angels, Michael and Gabriel. These guys are important because there's only two named in the entire book, but there's a whole bunch of other people named like 3000 other human beings, but two angels. And here's one of them Gabriel. And he says, I am Gabriel.

1 (15m 30s):

I stand in the presence of God himself. And I have sent to speak to you and to tell you this good news, and now you will be silent and not able to speak until the day. This happens because you did not. What believe my words, which will come true at their appointed time. Here's the angel said, I've told you that your God sent me to say this good news, this miracles coming to tell you that prophecies are being fulfilled. A miracle was happening. And you don't believe in because of that, your mouth will be silenced. And that word here could be translated as he's made mute.

1 (16m 10s):

Or it could be that he's deaf. And probably because of later in the chapter, he has to make signs to talk to people. He's probably mute and deaf for this season of his life, because he did not believe it's very possible for all of us to be an unbelieving believer, just like Zechariah and be religious, go to church, come from a good church family and be like, oh yeah, my grandpa was a Baptist preacher. Okay. It doesn't matter because we all can live with those doubts and questions like Zechariah here, the unbelieving believer, but just like the angel and God himself was trying to speak to Zechariah.

1 (16m 50s):

I think he's trying to speak to us through the example of Zechariah that we need to believe. Don't be an unbelieving believer. It's time to open up our minds to the possibility that miracles can still happen. And I think that this is important for us because there is a lot of evidence to believe in miracles today. And I don't just mean happened way back and then God's done with it. No, no, no. We have reasonable and scientific and medical reasons to believe in miracles today. And that's what we're going to talk about right now. You know, and this is, this is important because in our day and age, a lot of people think, well, the smart people don't believe in miracles.

1 (17m 37s):

And it stems really back from the 17 hundreds where there was a guy named David Hume, he was a philosopher and he famously kind of took all these ideas because there's always been unbelievers. But, but at the time he wrote this book and this treatise on miracles, it's called on miracles. And he made this argument. He said, well, a miracle is a violation of nature of the natural loss. It's a violation of nature. And the

laws of nature are fixed. They cannot be violated. Therefore miracles can happen. That was his argument. Some of your thinking, well, that sounds kind of circular reasoning maybe, but this was an argument that convinced a lot of people.

1 (18m 20s):

And for a lot of people say, Hey, look, they point to human. They say, Hume has proven it. You'll hear atheists. Even to this day, Dawkins in the like say Hume proved it. Hundreds of years ago, miracles can't happen. Problem is, is there's some problems with Hume's argument. It doesn't actually hold up when you think about it, because he talks about the laws of nature that they, they, they can't be violated, but here's the thing about the laws of nature. We don't quite understand all of them. Think about Newtonian physics. You guys remember that we learned about sir, Isaac Newton, you remember him? He had an apple, right?

1 (19m 1s):

As the story goes, an apple fell on a tree and hit him for the first head first time. And he's like, oh, there must be a thing like gravity. I don't know if he was the very first person for an apple to fall on their head or to denote, oh my gosh, apples fall. Okay. But he put it all together. And he figured out that there's a such thing as gravity that pulls things down right on, on our planet. And then he looked at these laws and he said, okay, if there's there's gravity, and then he started developing all these other rules and it led to this whole branch of Newtonian physics. Some of you guys studied this in school way back when you might not remember some of you do it all the time. Cause you're an engineer, you know, you're like, oh yeah, Newtonian physics was so great because it helped us understand the laws of nature.

1 (19m 41s):

Right? And for 200 years, millions of times a day, Newtonian physics were proved over and over again. We know it was true. It was so great that it helped us have the industrial revolution. Based on these rules, we figured out so much stuff. And then came along a guy by the name of Albert Einstein and Albert Einstein had some crazy ideas about things like relativity. And then some of Einstein's ideas started to get proved. And now there's this whole branch of science called quantum mechanics. And we have to throw out a lot of what people believed was the laws of nature for 200 years.

1 (20m 22s):

And guess what all of this has happened since the time of Hume, the laws of nature, as we know it, keep expanding and growing. It's an interesting way to think about the world. One philosopher today. And he's not a believer in Jesus Christ, okay. His secular philosopher. And he said this, he wrote a whole book on Hume. And as you can see here, the title of it is Hume's abject failure. It's conclusion. So to be blunt, I contend that of miracles is an abject failure. Hume failed in his philosophy, his philosophical argument. And some of the reasons for this is because look at it, we're learning more and more about the world and the laws we think governed.

1 (21m 6s):

Everything are not as clear as we thought they were. It's interesting because just think about this apple. If I hold it out and I drop it, what's going to happen. Think guys, I know this is hard. Remember the high school physics, what happens if I drop this apple it'll fall, it'll hit the stage, right? But you look at this, it didn't hit the stage. What happened? What happened, guys? I intervened something. Interview a hand intervened. Perhaps there could be something that you don't see intervening, right?

1 (21m 47s):

Maybe God's invisible hand acting to intervene. See a miracle is not actually a violation of nature. It's just God acting in a way that we can't see or understand. Does that make sense? Hume even talks about this. I'm sorry, John Earman in his book about Hume. He concludes. And he says, if we to try to define a miracle as an event that is incompatible with laws of nature, that it seems that water changing into wine, a dead man, coming back to life, et cetera are not miracles because they are not incompatible with quantum mechanics. Huh? Get this water turned into wine. We actually already have a process for turning water into wine.

1 (22m 28s):

Do you guys know that it's called fermentation? What Jesus did was just did it in an instant, okay. The dead coming back to life. Can't every single one of us imagine a future where there's been scientific and medical advances where the dead could come back to life. It's just beyond what we understand now. So if God and his invisible hand can make things happen quicker or in a different way than we have figured out yet, it's not actually a violation of nature itself. And I do think he's wrong. I do think those things are miracles. But what we're saying is that as our understanding of the laws of nature, expand, we realize all these things could happen.

1 (23m 9s):

They could happen. I think Augustine and said it well like 1500 years ago, miracles are not contrary to nature. Only contrary to what we know about nature. Could God's invisible hand be intervening in history? So what this tells us is that from a reasonable, rational, philosophical perspective, miracles are possible. There is good reasonable ground to believe in miracles, but it's more than that because there actually is evidence for miracles today. If you guys might not know this because you might not be paying attention.

1 (23m 52s):

But when fascinating thing is, since 1970, there have been more miracles reported in the news. And even in medical journals than there ever have been in the a hundred years prior than that, we think that they're not happening today. That's wrong. Just not aware of it. And if you go to rise, denver.com/miracles, I have some links to some news stories, as well as to a couple of medical journal articles that you can look at.

Well-researched stories. I have these two books up here by Craig keener. They're very thick and very long he's a scholar. And his thing is miracles. The credibility of the new Testament counts, but he doesn't just look

at the new Testament miracles.

1 (24m 32s):

He hunts down miracles all over the globe. He went to seven different continents to interview people, to find scientific medical evidence. And he reports a lot of the miracles that have happened since 1970 in these books. He has a follow-up book that just came out like this last month. So I haven't gotten to read it yet, but it hasn't even more stories of miracles that have been reported. And I think it's fascinating in his book, he talks about the fact that it's, that it's people all over the globe on all seven continents that he says in estimated 200 million people alive today have personally experienced a miracle. It's not even like they're that rare 200 million in another survey here in the United States, they found that 38% of adults, which is equivalent to 95 million people have personally experienced a miracle in our country.

1 (25m 27s):

So it's not just those yang who ignorance around the world. Okay. Talk about ethnocentric. Right? Okay. And it's not even just us dumb ignorant Americans. Okay. It's our medical doctors. Here's a fascinating survey that found that 75% of medical doctors believe in miracles, 75%, that 60% of them pray personally for their patients. Yeah. That's awesome. And get this a 55% of those doctors have personally experienced some medical thing that they can only contribute a tribute to a miracle over half of doctors report that they have something that they would say. I think that's a miracle. These are the most educated people that we have life.

1 (26m 8s):

And yet, for some reason, there's this lie going around that miracles don't happen today or in our country must be from like the father of lies. Okay. Trying to deceive all of us. So there's good evidence. Some of you are like, well, I don't know. Like I just wish there was like some evidence that was like peer reviewed. Well, we got that too. Okay. I'm just gonna read to you guys a couple of the accounts that have been published in the last few years in peer reviewed medical journals. Okay. And there's more, you can find this at horizon home session miracles. The first case study is written by Clarissa Ramez, David Zaretsky, and Joshua W. Brown in an article entitled case report of gastro-paresis healing.

1 (26m 52s):

16 years of a chronic syndrome resolved after proximal intercessory. Prayer comes from April of 2019. So they talk about this young baby who was born, a male who at one week was dealing with a lot of cramping. And vomiting took that boy into the hospital after a whole gamut of tests. They figured out that he has gastro-paresis. That was the diagnosis, which is basically that the stomach doesn't void properly. And it's a lifelong condition that the prognosis for this boy was extremely poor. No treatments at all were working. So they had to put two tubes into this baby. So for the next 16 years, this boy could not eat or drink orally right.

1 (27m 41s):

16 years. And no treatments were working for that entire 16 years, but he was a believer in Jesus Christ as were his parents. So they attended a church that was having a special prayer night and they asked for healing. So on November 6th, 2011 at age 16, this boy was taken to the church and they prayed over him. They laid hands on him and prayed for 15 minutes for this young man. And at that time he experienced electrical heat surging through his body and was instantaneously healed that day. He started eating and drinking out of his mouth. Again, when in more tests, six years later, when this article was published, he did not need any treatment at all, or any help for his gastro-paresis.

1 (28m 29s):

He had been completely and totally healed. Hallelujah. Yes. We can say that the authors of this article at the end of it conclude that this was remarkable because it could not even be a placebo effect because placebo effects have been tried in double blind studies on gastro-paresis and they don't help. Okay. They could only contribute, attribute this to healing because of prayer. Okay. Here's another one, a case report. It was titled of instantaneous resolution of juvenile macular degeneration, blindness after proximal intercessory prayer. And this one comes from 2021. This year. It was published a young woman, legally blind for 12 years with juvenile macular gender generation was instantly healed when she was prayed over at a church prayer meeting and her eyesight remained intact for 47 years up to the time of the articles publication.

1 (29m 23s):

That's just two, there's more. If you read those articles, you can read all the other miracle stories that are cited in those two journal reports. There is more evidence and better evidence for miracles than there ever has been in all of history. Doctors believe it, people all over the world, it believe in an experience. And yet, for some reason, a lot of people are unbelieving believers or just flat out unbelievers. And I want to challenge you. Don't be an unbelieving believer. It's time to believe that God still works in miracles today. He still is at work and we've got to have an open mind because that's what scientific evidence is all about. We get at least say, I don't understand it. Maybe it's a miracle.

1 (30m 4s):

I'm fine. If you see that, maybe it's better than Zachariah. Didn't believe at all can't happen, but we've got to have it because here's the thing just like with Newtonian physics, you think it's all right until boom. One thing changes everything, right? It's just like when people were first going to Australia and they came back to England and they said, Hey, we found this mammal that lays eggs. The people in England were like, you guys are crazy. You're ignorant, that's stupid. You're just telling tales. So they went back to Australia, found a pelt of this animal and brought it back to England and they still didn't believe you're just making it up. There's no way that this animal could have a duck bill and web feet and legs and be a mammal.

1 (30m 44s):

It's just not real. But we all know that there's a thing called a duck-billed Platypus. Don't we, even when they were presented with the evidence, they still didn't believe. And that sadly is how a lot of people are today.

And they have been thousands of years, an angel sitting there. Hey Zachariah. I don't believe. Okay. So I want to challenge you. Don't be an unbelieving believer at the end of solely. Did you guys remember that movie solely with the captain Sullenberger? He landed his plane on the Hudson rain. He's talking to one of the national transportation safety board. People who's investigating and telling him that like, yeah, there were, there were birds that flew into both engines and both engines blew up at the same time on both wings.

1 (31m 26s):

That's why I had to land on lots. And they're like, no, that couldn't happen. They said nothing like that has ever happened. It's unprecedented. And of course he responds and said, well, everything's unprecedented until it happens. Right. And we all know that there are such things as unprecedented times, don't we who's ready for some precedent at times. Right. I am right. Yeah. Okay. We know that unprecedented things happen. So if you were saying, oh, I've never experienced a miracle. I've never witnessed it. I've never talked to someone who gave me a legitimate account. Okay. That doesn't mean they can't happen. And it's time to expand our minds and our hearts to the reality that God could and is still at work today.

1 (32m 5s):

Don't be an unbelieving believer because Elizabeth did get pregnant. Did you know that? Okay, we see this at the end of verse of our passage in verse 24 and Luke was an investigator. He investigated, he interviewed all these eye witnesses and this is the account he wrote in verse 24. Then after this Zachariah's wife, Elizabeth became pregnant. The miracle happened this woman way past the ability to be pregnant, who had a physical issue. She got pregnant and for five months remained in seclusion. And in verse 25, the Lord has done this for me. She said in these days he has shown his favor and taken away my disgrace among the people, God performed a miracle for this woman and his family, John, the Baptist was born.

1 (32m 58s):

And one amazing thing. I don't know if you guys know this, not only did John prepare the way, but Elizabeth was actually a relative of Mary and a little while later, Mary found out she was pregnant, even though she was a firsthand and Mary and Elizabeth actually hung out for three months together, those babies were in the same place. God was doing this incredible miracle. The not only John, the Baptist fulfilling prophecy would come to prepare the way for the Messiah. But the number Sai himself, God himself would be born among us. Live among us, love us, die on the cross and then perform the greatest miracle of all and rise from the dead to show that God still is the God of miracles. And he still is the God of miracles today. So don't be an unbelieving believer, challenging you this way because some of us live every day as if miracles don't happen.

And I want to challenge you if you're here and you're an unbelieving believer or you're like, I don't know about all this stuff. I want to challenge you with a simple prayer. Pray this God show me some miracles. It's pretty simple prayer, right? We're not testing God. We're just saying, God, I want to see your stuff. I want to

see you work. I said that prayer earlier this week, and then that day, God did something pretty amazing. And I'm going to tell you about it next week to come back for next week for week two in this series. But really just start praying that God show me some miracles. I don't know when or if it's going to happen, but might as well ask him, right? James Jesus's brother says you have not because you ask not. So let's ask God to reveal himself to us. And I think that's a good thing. Even if you are not a believer at all here today, ask God to reveal himself to you.

Because if he's not real, who cares that you just said that prayer, right? But if he is real and he shows up, you're going to want to know. And you want that God of miracles on your side, right? So don't be an unbelieving believer. Let's pray, Lord God. I pray that you challenge all of us to have greater faith to believe and to ask for miracles or God, I pray that you would reveal some miracles to all of us, to those who are doubting or struggling in their faith show up in a real powerful way that they can attribute to nothing but you and your invisible hand at work in this world, in their lives, for those who are struggling.

And they say, I don't think, I believe at all the agnostic, the atheist person, who's, who's too intelligent to believe.
