1 (45s):

All right, it's time for a new Hope part two. I'm so glad you guys are here today. My name is Matt Wolf. I'm the lead pastor here to Rice Church, Denver, And. we are all about helping people follow Jesus. We wanna help you follow Jesus and for you in turn to help others follow Jesus. Because following Jesus is the path to the fullest life and the only path to eternal life. So welcome. Give you guys a, a, a pat on the back for being here this morning on this snowy Sunday. Give you guys a pat on the back. And. you know, I, I have to tell you guys, when I got here first thing in the morning, there was a huge group of volunteers who were here before me and they've been practicing, they've been setting up and getting everything ready. So let's give a hand to all of our faithful volunteers, all the people serving in our church. Man, you guys are the best.

1 (1m 26s):

We, we love you so much. Well welcome online, welcome in person. We are going to jump into part two of our series, A New Hope through the Book of Habakkuk. in today. We are going to ask and listen to what God has to say to answer a really difficult question. Why, Does, God, Allow, Evil Why Does God Allow Evil. There was a survey done a few years ago and they asked people, If, you could ask God any question, what would it be? And the number one question that people said they wanted to ask God was this Why, Does, God, Allow, Evil. Why is there so much pain and suffering in the world?

1 (2m 9s):

And it's a great question and it's a question that leads a lot of people away from faith in God. I shared about a young man I talked with in my message last week and he had said that he had grown up in faith but he walked away because of how much pain, suffering, and evil he saw in the world. Some of you might even feel that way right now. Some may even shared you this, this message with you because you have that question because there's a lot of bad things in our world, right? And where's God when that's happening? Is he even there? The French author Jules Renar once said, I don't know if God exists, but it would be better for his reputation if he didn't because if there is this evil, why doesn't he step in and do anything about it?

1 (2m 52s):

So, we are not afraid of the tough questions here and neither is God. In fact, he gave us this whole book of the Bible Habakkuk which asks and answers some of these really difficult questions. So that's what we are going to dive in today. A lot of theologians and Phil, Phil philosophers consider this the hardest question to deal with and answer. And it leads a lot of people to, to not believe So, we are gonna find the answer in the next 25 minutes. Yeah, right? We probably won't. Okay? And yet we can learn at least a little bit from God what he has to say in response to this difficult question. So what we're gonna do today is we are going to think this is a message that will be a little more philosophical, a little more theological than maybe some of you are used to.

1 (3m 35s):

And if that's you, I want you to think today, can we focus in the words of your third grade teacher? Let's put your thinking cap on. Okay? Can we do that today? I know this is mean. We're gonna need to think, we're

gonna need to focus. And if you're like, well Matt, what does it practically mean for my life? You need to come back Next week. This is going to be a little more of a heady message, but I think we need to think about it first and then Next week, we're gonna talk about what it actually means for our lives and how do we get through some of the evil suffering and hard things. Okay? Is that all right? Okay. So today what we're gonna do is jump into Habakkuk chapter one, verse 12. And we're kind gonna cover all of chapter two, which is a lot of scripture. We're gonna move pretty quickly. So I need you guys to focus, pay attention, take notes, If you need to and If, you have your Bible open up to Habakkuk chapter one 12 If.

1 (4m 19s):

you have your smartphone. Use the YouVersion Bible app And. you can find our Rise Church Denver event and save your notes right there. This might be one of those messages you wanna take some notes on 'cause we're gonna see five different responses that God has for us in his word to answer this question. Why, Does, God, Allow Evil. Five responses, and it's not all of them, but they're gonna be five pretty clear answers from this scripture. So let's look at Habakkuk one 12 together where Habakkuk brings his second complaint to God. Lord, are you not from everlasting? My God, my holy one? You will never die. You Lord have appointed them to execute judgment.

1 (5m 6s):

You my rock, have ordained them to punish. Okay, so what's going on here? Habakkuk is a prophet and a prophet was someone who's a spokesperson for God. There's a bunch of different prophets in the Bible. This he's considered a minor prophet, not meaning he's lesser, but just he has a short book, just three chapters. And Habakkuk prophecy is a little different than what we often get in the other prophets because here he complains to God, he questions God, he's angry at God and he has recorded what he says to God. And then God responds to him. It's really fascinating how God put this in his word. He wants us to have this, the, the this question So, we looked at his first question last week because he was in a time where things were bad in the nation of Judah, God's people were under foreign rule of the Assyrians, things were bad.

1 (5m 54s):

The nation had turned away from God. There was a lot of sin, a lot of evil, a lot of corruption in their country. And habakkuk's like, when are you gonna deal with all the bad stuff in our country? Like where are you? Why haven't you done anything? And God said, oh, I am doing something. I'm going to bring something to bring judgment. And it is the Babylonians. So in this passage here, when he talks about them, he's talking about this foreign nation, the Babylonians. So basically God said last week, like you think bad things are bad in your own country, that there's injustices happening, sin just allowing to, to go on evil to happen. Don't worry, I'm going to bring some justice. I'm gonna get rid of the bad guys by bringing in someone who's even worse. That's was God's answer last week. You think these people are bad, I'll take care of them by bringing in even worse people, the Babylonians who will attack you and bring judgment and justice to those people who have been unjust.

1 (6m 43s):

So now he's like, wait a second, you God are good. You're pure perfect. He says that you're pure, you're a holy you. He even says, my God, my holy one in verse 12, as far as I can tell, this is the only time in the Bible where someone is calls God my holy one. Like there's a personal relationship. I love you God, you're holy, you're perfect, you're righteous. Why then do you allow evil? Even use evil for your purposes doesn't make sense. And he makes that complaint pretty clear. If, you keep reading in verse 13, he says, your eyes are too pure to look on evil. You cannot tolerate wrongdoing. Why then do you tolerate the treacherous?

1 (7m 26s):

If you're perfect, God, why do you allow evil to happen? What are you doing? Aren't you gonna do something about it? This is that philosophical question, right? This theological question that leads a lot of people away from faith in God. If there's so much Evil, God, why don't you do something about it? How could you even allow, let alone use evil people like that in our world, the Scottish philosopher David Hume, who a lot of people look to as the father of skeptics today, he wrote this argument that's often called the problem of evil. And he said, this is why we shouldn't believe in God. He said, is God, he asks, willing to prevent evil but not able.

1 (8m 9s):

Then he's impotent. Is he able but not willing then he is malevolent. Is he both able and willing? Why then is there evil? And that led David Hu a lot of people since then to not believe in God because of this problem of evil. It's very similar to what Habakkuk is saying. Okay, I if, if you're good and if you're powerful, then why don't you do something about this. If you're not doing something, where are you? This is the deepest, hardest question And. we are tackling it today. So. we are gonna see from God five different reasons why God allows evil, because he is all powerful, he is all good and he still allows evil and suffering to exist in our world.

1 (8m 59s):

So why is that? Here are the five things we're gonna learn. And it it's in response to the question, Why, Does, God, Allow, Evil. So the responses are all gonna be because of these five reasons. So here's our first one if you're taking notes, because he made us free, he made human beings to be free to have their own moral decisions and will. And because of that there's a lot of evil in this world. This answer actually comes from Habakkuk's own complaint. He kind of hints at this answer already in his question. I think he knew, Hey I, I know why some of this is happening, but I want you guys to see this in verse 14. As Habakkuk is complaining, he says in verse 14, you have made people like the fish in the sea, like the sea creatures that have no ruler.

1 (9m 43s):

People are like the fish in the sea. They go wherever they want, they swim around like you. You try to control 'em, you can't. They're just gonna swim everywhere. You try to catch 'em, they're just gonna wiggle right out,

okay? People are like the fish, we can make whatever decisions we want. And he says, Habakkuk realizes, and this is really bad because then somebody can throw a net in there and catch you and kill you, which is what happens. Human beings are given by God the free choice to choose right or wrong. That's how he created us in the garden. He created us perfect At the very beginning he created Adam and Eve and he said, Hey, you guys have freedom. I'm giving you all the good things. Everything is perfect here. You want nothing, need nothing. Just don't eat from the one tree of the knowledge of good and evil.

1 (10m 24s):

They had a choice to make. And what choice did they make? They chose to sin to break God's rule. They ate from the tree. And that was the start of what theologians call the fall. And if you're like, oh man, they're the reason why everything's so bad, you are too. Okay? 'cause you are given free choice too. And, you have messed up, you have done wrong, you have sin, you have hurt people, you have lied, you have cheated And, you have done evil. And because of this freedom, we cause a lot of harm to each other. And it leads people to want to take more things for themselves than they should take. And it causes more and more evil in our world because of freedom. We have free choices.

1 (11m 5s):

Dr. Meg Meer in one of her books tells a story about a time when she was just a, a young girl learning about this idea and she and her family were eating dinner with a couple who were Holocaust survivors. They'd gone through Auschwitz and survived. She says, as they were having this conversation with this couple at their dinner table, the couple kept talking about God and their faith and she was really confused like how could they believe in God after seeing and experiencing so much evil after seeing their family and friends killed at the hands of the Nazis. So Meg's mom asked this couple like, how could you still have faith after all that you have experienced?

1 (11m 47s):

How could you believe in God? And the the woman of this couple responded, she said, you know, know God didn't make the camp or kill the Jews. God made men who are free and gave them the brains that could figure out how to torture other people. She said, I never blamed God for that. In fact, she said many of us in the camp had faith in fact that that was the only way we had hoped to make it through. Because we believed in a God. She recognized that God had given free will for people to do some evil, awful, terrible things. And it's because of that freedom that we choose. Human beings choose to hurt each other and make things worse.

1 (12m 28s):

In our world, a lot of the evil in our world goes back to the fact that God allows us and created us with the freedom to choose to not follow his will. And God allows that to happen in order to do something even better. Johnny Erickson taught him, said that sometimes God allows what he hates to accomplish what he loves. See, God has a purpose behind here. So we've seen our first reason why God allows evil and the first thing

is that he made us free. And the second thing is that he hasn't finished the story yet. And I don't mean that he doesn't know the end of the story.

1 (13m 9s):

He does, he wrote it before the creation of the world. He knows what's going to happen. He just hasn't brought it to its fulfillment yet we're still in the middle of the story. And that conflict and that tension where there's still a struggle going on, we haven't seen the end of the story. And that's what God is going to say to now. So Habakkuk finishes up his complaint and then in verse two of chapter two, God begins to respond to Habakkuk's complaint says, then the Lord replied, write down the revelation and make it plain on tablets. So that a herold may run with it. In other words, I want everybody to hear what I'm about to say in verse three, four. God says the revelation awaits and appointed time.

1 (13m 50s):

It speaks to the end and will not prove false. Though it linger, wait for it. It will certainly come and will not delay. Some of you need to memorize this verse because it's not the end of this story yet. We're waiting, we're in this intermediary stage and and Habakkuk definitely was because things were bad. The Babylonians hadn't even attacked yet probably when he started writing this book. So he's now a a few years, maybe 10, 15 years before the Babylonians would completely distort, destroyed Judah. And then it would be get this another almost 50 years before the Babylonians would be defeated, which they were. So I don't think Habakkuk would've seen the end of that.

1 (14m 33s):

Like Daniel was a little child. That's why he was able to make it to the end of the story and and see that. But it's a long time. There might be multiple generations before things are restored to the way God wanted them to be. But he's just seeing in the middle of the story. See? See, God has a plan. He knows the end. And it's not just that the Babylonians are coming but for us as well, he has an opponent time when things will get better, when there will be an end to our trial and the suffering and evil in our world though it linger, he says, wait for it If. you ever felt like it's lingering forever? Wait for it. It will certainly come and will not delay though it linger. Wait for it. That's what God is saying. This story is not finished yet.

1 (15m 16s):

You get this? We, we took our kids to their first movie in a theater last year, okay? We, we had seen the first Spider-Man into the spider verse with our kids. You guys know that movie? Okay, If, you don't. It's okay, just not along. We saw the first one. So we're taking 'em to the second one that came out last summer. They're excited. Their first movie theater. This is a big deal. Get the popcorn, they're excited. We get to the end of the movie and spoiler alert, it's a cliffhanger, okay? It's part one of two. We didn't know that going in, but man we were disappointed. Have anybody seen a movie like that? And, you didn't know it was a cliffhanger and then it's over And. You're like, what? Are you kidding me? Especially now I gotta wait two more years for the sequel to come out. I still gotta film it like they haven't even started filming. You guys saw Dune last year,

1 (15m 58s):

And you're like, what? Didn't even know there was a dune part two. It's disappointing, right? When you get to the end and you're like, when is the next one coming? We are frustrated, angry. Some people hate those movies because they're like, I didn't know I should have waited until the second one came out, right? We don't like being left in the tension, in the struggle and in the conflict. And guess what? That's where we are in human history. We are in the middle of the conflict. The story isn't over yet. But when you do see the sequel, when you get to the climax, when there's finally resolution, then you go, ah, okay, the Infinity War is over, right? Isn't that what you say? Like finally things are good, but If, you go back and watch like the first movie.

1 (16m 39s):

Like it doesn't have quite the same amount of tension, does it? Because you know what's gonna happen? Like it's not as scary, it's not as tense. There's not as much conflict because you know the end of the story. Well, God knows the end of the story. He says it's coming. I've planned it. It's gonna be better though it linger, wait for it, it's gonna be good. You're just not to the end of the story yet. So when we are in the middle right now, we say, why is there so much evil? God is saying wait for it. Don't worry. I'll take care of it. I have a plan. I have a plan. And that leads us to the next two points because God does have an end to the story and it's going to cause two things in the first one. Point three is that he will save the faithful, the good, the righteous.

1 (17m 20s):

Those who put their faith in God and his son, they will be saved. Might be evil and suffering and hardship and trial now. But you will be saved. God is saying, look at verse four with me of chapter two. See, God says the enemy is puffed up. His desires are not upright, but the righteous person will live by his faithfulness. This verse is probably the most famous verse in all of Habak and that's why Next week, we're gonna go back and look at it in more depth. The righteous will live by his faithfulness, meaning God will take those who are living the right way in faithfulness to God and he will save them.

1 (18m 2s):

They will live even though around them is suffering and death. Even if they die in this life, he's saying they will live. There is hope on the other side of the grave, there will be good, there will be salvation for those who are faithful to God. The righteous will live by faith. And God saves the faithful he always does. Though there is suffering and evil around him, he saves the faithful. It reminds me of the story of Abraham in ex in Genesis chapter 18. God tells Abraham, he's like, I'm about to destroy these two towns, Sodom and Gomorrah. And Abraham's like, wait, like don't destroy him. He said, If, you could find God If, you could find 50 righteous people.

1 (18m 41s):

Don't destroy those cities. And God says, okay, sure He negotiates. I won't destroy it if there's 50 good people in that city. And then Abraham's like, what about 45? And God says, okay, 45. And then Abraham keeps negotiating. What about 40? What about 30? What about 20? What about 10? Would you save that city for 10 righteous people? And God says, yes, I will save even just 10 righteous people. But there weren't 10 righteous people in Sodom and Gomorrah. There was four. Do you know what God does in the very next chapter? We don't realize that these are connected. The very next chapter, God sends in a couple of angels on a rescue mission and he rescues lot and his family and gets them out there 'cause they're the only faithful people in that entire to two towns.

1 (19m 24s):

He still rescues. He rescues every single one. There's not one faithful person who will not be saved by God. That's the heart of our God. And in fact, this is the reason why God is allowing some of the evil and suffering in our world. 'cause he hasn't saved everyone yet in two Peter three, nine we're told this, the Lord isn't slow about keeping his promises as some people think he is. In fact, God is patient because he wants everyone to turn from sin and no one to be lost. We have a saying here, right? Seek the one. See, God is the one who seeks the one first. If there's one person who might re repent and find eternal life, if there's one person who will be faithful, God will save that one person.

1 (20m 6s):

He even sends us to go and seek the one, right? And that's why sometimes he allows bad things to happen. 'cause he's like, I wanna save as many as possible and I'll save every single last one. Even if it means things are hard. In the meantime, there was a pastor who went to get his haircut at a barbershop. It wasn't me, okay? He sits down, says, yeah, Sawyer. So he does like his haircuts. Okay? So he sits down in in the, in the barber shop chair and and the barber starts talking to him and he says, you know what I, I can't believe you're wasting your life as a Pastor 'cause God doesn't exist. The Pastor says, well why do you say that?

1 (20m 46s):

The barber says, well look at all the suffering and evil in the world. God can't exist if he allows all that to happen. So the pastor just kind of nods along and sits there, gets his hair cut, finished, he pays, and he goes out and walks outta the barbershop and they're on the street. He sees a homeless man, real manje, long ratty, nasty hair. So brings the man into the barbershop and he says, Hey barber, I don't believe in barbers. The barber's like, what? Why would you say that? And the pastor's like, well, look at this guy. Look at his nasty, long, terrible hair. If, you see hair that bad? That means barbers can't exist.

1 (21m 27s):

And the barber's like, no, no, no. It just means he hasn't come to me yet. And in the same way evil exists because people have not gone to God yet. See, he's waiting patiently because he wants us to repent, to come to him and find salvation by faith. And let me tell you, I am so glad that Jesus didn't come back while I was in high school. Can I get an amen from somebody on that one? Think about it. In your own life, can't,

aren't you grateful he didn't come back while you were still living in sin and addiction and turned away from him? Aren't you glad that he waited until you had found salvation in eternal life?

1 (22m 8s):

And what if by waiting just a little bit longer, he could save another person that you care about someone you love? Wouldn't it be worth the evil and the suffering that we have to experience in the meantime? I'm telling you, I would. I'd wait. That's how God is. He wants to save as many as he can. So that's our third reason He will save the faithful. And the fourth one is the flip side of this, because he will bring perfect justice. Why is he waiting? So that justice can actually happen and this life and the one to come, it's interesting, this next section of Habakkuk chapter two, God gives five reasons why the Babylonians are really bad.

1 (22m 50s):

He doesn't disagree with Habakkuk. He's like, oh, they're not as bad as you think. No, he's like, no, they're worse than you think they're evil. And here's five terrible things that they do. And here are five ways that they are actually going to face judgment in their own way. So I'm just just gonna show you two. So look with me in verse six, the second half of verse six, God says this about the Babylonians, woe to him, woe to the Babylonians who piles up stolen goods and makes himself wealthy by extortion. How long must this go on? They're ripping people off, taking advantage of people. But this is what's gonna happen. Will not your creditors suddenly arise? Will they not wake up and make you tremble? Then you will become their prey.

1 (23m 30s):

God is saying the Babylonians will take advantage of people, they will steal. They will take things that do not belong to themselves. And guess what? Eventually someone will come and take what's theirs. And that is what happened in history. The Persians came and destroyed the Babylonians and everything that they had stolen from others got stolen from them. Justice actually happened in this life. And sometimes we see that in our own world. When people like Bernie Madoff fall or or Enron or Elizabeth Holmes, they, they deceive other people, steal from them. They face judgment in this life. And sometimes God is just allowing justice to take place. Let's look at the second example of this in verse 15.

1 (24m 11s):

God says, woe to him again. The Babylonians woe to him who gives drink to his neighbors, pouring it from the wineskin till they are drunk, So that he can gaze on their naked bodies. This is mean. They're taking advantage of people sexually. Verse 16, you the Babylonians will be filled with shame instead of glory. Now it is your turn. Drink and let your nakedness be exposed. You're taking advantage of people physically and sexually. You are shaming them. You will be shamed. And this too happened to the Babylonians and it happens in our world. We've seen it happen a bunch in Hollywood because of the Me Too movement, haven't we? People that are taking advantage of young women, young men, they're facing their own judgment.

1 (24m 55s):

Harvey Weinstein, r Kelly, bill Cosby, we see these people fall and be disgraced in this life, right? But do you know why we need God in this evil world? Because nothing can actually bring perfect justice in this world. We need another life after this one. And I know this because just a few years ago, Ariel Castro was arrested. Do you remember him? He's the guy who kept a bunch of women captive in his basement as slaves when he was eventually arrested. He went through a trial and he was sentenced by a jury of his, of his peers to 1000 years in prison because they knew one lifetime is not enough to punish him for what he did to those women.

1 (25m 40s):

We need something beyond the grave. Do you know what's even worse about this story? One month into his a thousand year sentence, he hung himself with his bedsheets one month of prison for all that he did to those women. It's not enough. We need there actually to be a hell. We need a God who can bring justice on the other side of the grave. There's a lot of things that happen in our life and people do not get their just due in this lifetime. But we can trust God who will bring perfect justice in the end. He will, whether in this life or the one to come, people will face perfect justice for what they did.

1 (26m 21s):

And I know a lot of us look at God when we ask this question and we're like, I think I would do things differently. You ever thought that I know I have. Like God, if I were in charge, I'd get that person back. I would not allow that to happen. I would stop that person before that did that, and that person would face way more punishment than they ever did. They got away with nothing, right? I, I think the past, the French pastor, JML Sabre, somebody correct my pronunciation after the service. Well the, the French pastor said this. He said, if God would concede me his omnipotence, his power for 24 hours, you would see how many changes I would make in the world.

1 (27m 4s):

But if he gave me his wisdom too, I would leave things as they are. If we could know what God is doing and how he's allowing things to happen, giving patience to the people who need it, bringing justice and judgment to the people who are going to need that too. If we could see all that he is doing in the world, I think all of us would trust him and say, I think you know what you're doing. I think there's more than even these five reasons why you allow evil in this world God. And the biggest reason of all. And the fifth one is because he will be glorified. He will be glorified throughout all of this, through it human history with with the evil that allows to happen, the suffering at the end, he will be the most glorified.

1 (27m 48s):

This is what he says in verse 14. God says, for the earth will be filled with the knowledge of the glory of the Lord as the waters cover the sea. Do waters cover the sea? I mean, yes. Okay. Right. So in the same way as the sea is filled with water, God's glory will be filling the earth and people will have the knowledge of it.

Meaning every single human being will one day know what God is doing. And they will look and they will be inspired to worship him in awe. They will will see his glory and they will know it firsthand. After we go through hard things in our life, we actually enjoy things even more on the other side.

1 (28m 32s):

You guys all know this to be true. I remember for us, going through five years of infertility made us enjoy having McKinley so much more than had we not suffered. I wanna go back and go through those five years again, but man did it make us enjoy it. We talked to another, another couple who went through infertility longer than us and they said, you know, now that we have a baby, we fight over who gets to change the diaper

2 (28m 53s):

Because

Going through pain and suffering actually opens up our heart to enjoy the good on the other side. And that's why we're gonna look at God that he came through, that he vanquished evil, that he conquered over all things And. we can see his plan intricately woven throughout all of human history. And through our lives And, we will say, wow, that's glory right there. That's amazing. And. we will bow down and worship him because we could never have conceived of something that great. So that's the fifth reason why God allows

And if you're ever thinking, but Matt, you don't know about my hard thing, about my suffering, about this thing I know about with this inter innocent person suffering. Let me tell you that there was actually only one person in human history who truly suffered innocently and it was God's own son, Jesus Christ. And that was the plan all along for hundreds and thousands of years. People waited for it, it lingered, right? Wait for it. What? The son of God is coming, the Messiah. And Jesus himself walked among us and he was the actual righteous one who never did anything wrong, never sinned. He spoke the truth. He loved people, he served people. He gave his life for other people. And instead of receiving good rewards and having a good, comfortable, nice life, he was rejected.

1 (30m 13s):

He was betrayed, he was beaten. He suffered an unjust trial and was given a sentence he did not deserve. They whipped him, they beat him. They spit on him. They stripped him naked. So that he felt the shame that we experience and they hung him up on a cross to die. I think Elizabeth Elliot was right when she said, our vision is so limited. We can hardly imagine a love that does not show itself in protection from suffering. The love of God did not protect his own son. God allowed evil to happen. And on that day, when Jesus died, it looked like evil had won, that Satan was victorious.

1 (31m 1s):

And that's when the earth shook. Because though they waited on the first day, on the second day, it lingered, didn't it? On the third day when they waited for it, Jesus conquered over death. He was raised from the dead and appeared to over 500 people. Over a span of 40 days, Jesus resurrected showing that God has power over the greatest evil of sin, death in the devil. And if God can conquer over that, he can conquer over every single other evil and suffering that we deal with now because Jesus is victorious. And, and I love the way that this passage ends in Habakkuk chapter two, verse 20, listen, listen to this verse with me.

1 (31m 42s):

God says this, the Lord is in his holy temple. Let all the earth be silent before him. See right now, God is in heaven. Jesus is seated on a throne. Just as you are seated in front of me, Jesus is on his throne and he has power over all things. And one day he will return. We look forward, that's what we're waiting for. Jesus will come again and he will judge the living and the dead. He will come with the keys of death and Hades in his hand. He will have a sword out of his mouth, the word of God.
